# **Capital Works Continue**

It is worth remembering that Hampshire Surrey and Counties are investing £5.6m of capital in the Canal over the period from 2011 to 2017. Over the summer, a lot of repair and improvements work have been going on as part of this capital programme. recent Basingstoke Canal News gives the details, but the highlights are: The towpath opposite the Canal Centre, which now looks



much better since it has been piled and surfaced (see above); Repairs to the towpath downstream towards Frimley Lodge Park (picking up from where the Society left off in 2012) now have also been undertaken, a job needing doing for many years; and the Dogmersfield landslip repair, being done in cooperation with the adjacent landower – this has absorbed rather a lot of Hampshire capital money, but nevertheless it is hoped to complete dredging and piling during the navigation and towpath closure period from 1<sup>st</sup> November. A major leak in an embankment was detected near Double Bridge in Dogmersfield during the summer and repaired luckily there was suitable plant nearby and the job could be completed promptly.

The <u>latest navigation report</u> has announced a programme of other repairs to take place this winter, including reinforcement of the Hermitage weir at St John's, the Rive ditch culvert replacement, structural repairs to several locks and gates replacement, and bed relining at Ash Embankment.

# Society To Hold Celebratory Woking Canal Festival In 2016

As already reported in the recent Basingstoke Canal News, the Society is planning for major celebrations next year of the 50th anniversary of its formation. 2016 will also be 25 years since canal navigation formally reopened in 1991. A boat rally and landside event celebrating both occasions will take place in the centre of Woking, Brookhouse at common, over the weekend of 6th and 7th of August 2016. Please put these dates in your



diaries. It will be called the Woking Canal Festival.

We are pleased that we have been approached by the <u>Historical Narrow Boat Club</u>, a nationwide group, who are also celebrating their 50<sup>th</sup> next year, and had chosen the Basingstoke on which to mark it. Not only do they wish to participate in our event, but they will also help with the organisation. They expect that (at the time of writing) around 40 of their historic boats will attend, including traditional pairs and trade boats. Woking Borough Council are also supporting and providing resources for the Festival.

Both the Society and HNBC want to have their own "party", and the schedule of events over the weekend will accommodate this. The Society has yet to decide the details, but we hope there will be an extensive exhibition of restoration photographs and videos, and we intend that those who were involved with the canal restoration will be specially invited. More details about the Festival will be posted over the coming months as plans evolve.


# **Work Party Activities**

#### Regular Workparty


Since completing the <u>Greywell tunnel portal project</u> in March (reported on in the <u>last bulletin</u>), the regular Society workparty did a lot of work around the Colt Hill wharf in Odiham in preparation for the <u>Magna Carta rally</u> that took place there in May. (This rally has been extensively reported in the last <u>Basingstoke Canal News</u> and on the <u>Society website</u>.) Improvements included resurfacing of around 100m of the towpath and the Colt Hill car park itself (*see right*).



The team then moved to Deepcut, to undertake repairs on the Wilderness weir next to Lock 28



have for years. A visiting Waterway Recovery Group started work on this last year but quickly



The opportunity has also been taken to build up with bank protection a low section of embanked towpath with an ominous-looking wash-out just downstream from Lock 28, and that too is nearly done.

#### Waterway Recovery Group

A WRG team led by Moose Hearnden visited the Canal over a weekend in July and repaired some brick quadrants on Locks 23 and 24. They laid a concrete foundation for a new quadrant at Lock 23

(right) to replace that which had been lost because of previous subsidence behind the chamber wall. We thank them for their contribution. These jobs will be high on the

Society team's list to complete next.



#### **Engineering Team**

Meanwhile, the Society engineering team have been continuing with the refurbishment of the BCA's patrol boat (*left*). Some delay resulted from the theft of the specially purchased outboard from the Ash Lock store, but the installation of a new one (complete with specially designed proprietary theft deterrent) is now completed. Just finishing touches and tests in the water now need to be done. Safety certification for both this boat and also the weedcutter has been obtained.



After two years where it was possible to keep the navigation open throughout the entire season, we were not quite so lucky this year. Following a relatively dry Autumn and Winter, supplies like the Broad Oak stream (*right*) dried up, and it was necessary to close the Deepcut flight for two 2-week periods, one in July and the other in August. Navigation resumed when the rains returned, which of course they did with a vengence....

Why is it that the Canal often has to close as soon as the weather warms up a bit? This article explains why.
