Chairman's Report

In the meantime the Society is active in its work in helping maintain the canal. Indeed the Basingstoke Canal has the highest ratio of volunteers per kilometre than any other UK canal, so many thanks to everyone involved. When all the hours are aggregated together we deliver the same effort as 27 full time staff! We are also actively doing our part in funding projects including the new electric Boat Kitty II at Woking. Last year's we invested £50k on a new weedcutter to help keep the canal clear.

However this does not address the major funding shortfall on the Canal. Indeed looking at the bigger picture, all of the UK's waterways see a similar picture. It is sad that many of the wonderful benefits of our canals are at risk.

The Canal Society has joined the Inland Waterways Association campaign to support robust funding for the national canal network, and hopefully we can reap some benefits. Those folks who are IWA members should be fully aware of what their plans are for the future.

As we move towards council elections, it's always interesting to get the opinions of the various candidates, simply by asking them for their views on the canal. We know that the stock answer is there is no money, but let's have a meaningful discussion of what can be done along with setting a plan for the future when funding will be available.

In the meantime, let's all actively work on helping protect our canal. Let's not take it for granted.

And to close on an upbeat note a photo of our new electric boat, Kitty II, below - and more on page 15. The motor for Kitty II has arrived at the boatbuilder in Garstang and the boat should be with us in the summer.

Oh and a final request: There is a notice attached to Arthur's Bridge in Woking from Woking Borough Council's Planning team, it would be really good if members could ping a supporting email.

Help safeguard your and your neighbourhood's health and habitat

The Society has been working hard to try to engage with members of the councils along the length of the canal. Our concern is that most have either reduced their funding or even cancelled any funding for the canal. Members of the Society committee have worked hard to ensure the councils are fully aware of the potential threat to the canal's future their funding decisions will definitely have.

The owners of the Basingstoke Canal Authority (Surrey and Hampshire County Councils) have made a number of far reaching proposals for the future management of the canal and at the time of writing we await the final outcome of its consultation with local councils on this important way forward.

The proposals include a requirement of councils to contribute to the canal funding in the future. However the current financial difficulties many councils find themselves in may lead to many of them declining to offer any funding at all.

Despite the poor response from the majority of councils your Society will continue to do all it can to ensure the canal's future along its complete length. Our conversations with councillors have been disappointing as far as available funding is concerned but we have been encouraged by their recognition of the canal's importance to

the communities who use the waterway and its surrounds, and its undoubted benefits to all.

We will continue to have discussions about how we can work together with councils to ensure they are fully aware of the consequences of their actions.

We are pleased that the Basingstoke Canal Authority is committed to keep the canal navigable along its whole length and we will support its progress towards the new management structure and funding proposals.

We are not alone in this funding crisis as Central Government has reduced its funding for all waterways across the UK. We will continue to join our friends across the UK to fight for funding to be reinstated at a level which will ensure the future of these wonderful assets to the country as a whole.



background on the huge difference that volunteers have made over the years.




Volunteers hard at work at Lock 7

Archivist Action

Over the last few months a team of Society members have begun the task of sorting through and cataloguing the considerable archives stored at the Canal Centre. The team consists of James Gregory-Marshall, Kevin Pizzey and Peter Whitlock, supported by Directors Ken Sankey and John Turner.

The archives consist of items relating to the Society itself along with canal related items that have been donated by many people over the last 50 years or so.

We have to date found many interesting documents from the Society's past such as plans of the proposal for the reconstruction of Guildford Road Bridge (King's Head Bridge) in the 1990's as well as earlier documents relating to the history of the canal including the auctioneer's copy of the canal sale catalogue from 1949 containing hand written notes of the bids made on each lot and the winning bidders. This can be seen on the right hand page.

The task of sorting and cataloguing the collection will take some time to complete. At present we estimate it will be around six months to discover what is in the archives. Our ultimate aim is

to make the archives and the history of the canal more accessible to members through the newsletters, the website, etc.

In future newsletters we will be writing a series of articles on both the history of the Society and the canal. These will be based on our research at the Canal Centre and also records kept at the Surrey History Centre in Woking and Hampshire Archives in Winchester.

We are currently at an early stage and haven't yet established firm proposals for the articles. They are, however, likely to include research on former owners of the canal, the auction in March 1949 (2024 is the 75th anniversary of the auction), the formation and early days of the Society and perhaps some accounts about specific canal architecture such as the many bridges.

We hope that you will find the articles interesting and we are happy to receive requests and suggestions regarding what you, the members would to read about. These can be sent to us at:



Working Parties Report

The last couple of work parties before Christmas saw a repeat of the stump clearing for some of the party while the other half had a large bonfire over two days which managed to dispose of practically all the collected trimmings. On the penultimate weekend we reverted to off bank clearance moving downstream from Colt Hill. On the Saturday while stopped for lunch against the towpath, and we were very lucky to have stopped where we did as less than a boat length in front of us a large dead tree fell down across the towpath and canal.

Fortunately we were able to pick up one of our chainsaw operators and cleared the tree, before continuing with the work on the off side.

The following working weekend everyone was out on clearing. Some worked on the towpath blitzing all the vegetation between the path and the canal, while the rest worked on the off bank. This resulted in an extremely good clearance, including material that had been in the water for a few years.

The second weekend work party in January was after a couple of storms and predictably there were trees down.

In the short stretch between Odiham bypass bridge and Broad Oak there were four lots of casualties. On Saturday we cleared two occurrences involving three trees and started on the third heap. We then had to call in the heavy chainsaw team for the large oak tree covered with ivy.

In the meantime, the stump grinding team had a repaired stump grinder and managed to clear the last remaining 13 stumps.

It was a massive effort spread over a total of five weekends, so congratulations to the team of five volunteers. Every weekend the work had started with moving the stump grinder and digger from the safe overnight store of the Galleon Marine Yard across the canal and then on the Sunday evening moving it all back again. They had to set up the screens to avoid stones etc being fired around, before starting the slow process of doing the actual grinding itself.

On the first weekend in February a number of the team spent Saturday at Ash Lock giving Jim Douglas, (the boat we want to sell) a clean and then giving a prospective customers a viewing. The rest of the party finished clearing the big oak tree and then moved on to clear another couple of windfalls near Wilks Water.

On the Sunday we had a complete work party and continued our off-bank clearance with a very successful days' work. We should meet up with the work that the West End group have been doing by the end of February.

As well as the fortnightly weekend work party, other groups work on the canal. The Tuesday group go out with one of the BCA rangers and perform routine maintenance work such as sapling clearance, painting lock gates etc. While the "West End Work party" turn out on various days to suit, doing other work as reported below.

At the end of September '23, when bird nesting season ended our "West End Work Party" continued sapling clearing working upstream on both sides of the canal from Sandy Hill Bridge with the intention of reaching Broad Oak Bridge before the end of February '24, the start of this year's bird nesting season. With one more work party scheduled for Friday 23rd February the objective is in sight and we're confident

we'll reach Broad Oak Bridge & maybe even get a little further.

It's clear the difference the group has made. Many thanks to all the volunteers who came out in all weather conditions, a great achievement.

The "West End Work Party" comprises BCS members who attend the BCA Tuesday Work Party & skippers from the BCA Work Boats, Patrol Boats & Conver weed cutter. The project was set up by Fiona Shipp from the Basingstoke Canal Authority (BCA), who provided all our tools (loppers, hand saws), PPE / first aid kit, life jackets etc.

Many thanks for support from the BCA and the use of Alan Flight, the society work boat.

Working Parties Continued

Also worthy of mention is another group of BCS volunteers who are spending February in the dry-dock at Deepcut. Each year, the BCA trip boat Patrol Boat which needs attention to "Rosebud". the BCA Patrol Boat & the rescue dory need their annual service and spruce up which is organised and resourced by a group of BCS volunteers.

After many years of sterling service, patrolling the Hampshire pound dealing with tasks which don't require the larger workboat, the Patrol Boat requires guite a bit of TLC. So, most of our efforts will be focussed on the the foredeck, the roof & also the transom. The hull also needs some minor fibreglass repair work. Hopefully, everything will be completed by the end of February so it will be ready to resume patrols on the Hampshire pound. Once again, many thanks to all the BCS volunteers.

Kitty II Progress

As reported in Issue 279, Work has now started on building Kitty II, our new electric trip boat with disabled access. Brayzel (the company who are building Kitty II have kindly provided updates on the progress.

Below you can see Kitty II on her way from the boatbuilder in Stoke, which happened at the beginning of January.



Now they have moved on to sprayfoaming the interior.

The area around the door has purposefully not been sprayfoamed as that is where the wheelchair lift will go.



There is still a considerable amount of negotiation underway to ensure we have the electrical supply in place for Kitty II when she arrives. Many thanks to John Turner who is leading this project.

Water Voles

In the early days of the John Pinkerton operation at Odiham it was not unusual to hear a quiet "plop" and to see a small brown animal paddling briskly across the canal behind the boat. Sadly Ratty, or the water vole as he should be called, is a great rarity nowadays thanks to the animal rights activists who misguidedly released 6000 mink from a farm in the New Forest in 1998.

It was great therefore to see a recent newspaper article giving the news that mink have been eradicated from East Anglia thanks to the use of smart traps that send a text and email when they are sprung.

Ordinary traps have to be monitored daily which makes their use almost impossible for the hard-pressed BCA; the smart traps reduced the number of visits by 98%. The work in East Anglia




was done by the Waterlife Recovery Trust, led by Prof Tony Martin of Dundee University. 441 traps were used to clear mink from an area of 2260 square miles and the voles are returning!

Might this be a cause that the Society could take up? How about adopting old Ratty as our mascot?


